Why Read Over The Summer?

- Summer should not mean taking a break from learning, especially reading!
- Efforts should be made during the summer to help children sustain reading skills, practice reading, and read for enjoyment.
- Summer reading programs have been shown to be the most important factor in avoiding the decline in reading skills educators refer to as "summer learning loss."
- Summer reading can bridge the gap between the end of one school year and the beginning of the next.
- Many studies indicate that the best readers are those who read a lot.
- Summer reading will help to promote student literacy in accordance with the State Standards.

What Can Parents Do To Help?

- Read and discuss the book with your child.
- Ask your child questions about the characters, setting, plot, and problem/solution for fiction books.
- Have your child share interesting facts for non-fiction books.
- Make real-life connections with the story whenever possible.
- Visit the local library to encourage your child to read additional books this summer.
